St Albans Backgammon Open 29th-30th April 2017

The weekend of Saturday 29th and Sunday 30th April, sees the eagerly-awaited return of the St Albans Open. Closely based on last year's highly successful format, the tournament features

- Space for just 64 players (book early to avoid disappointment last year sold out well ahead of the weekend!)
- Swiss format on Saturday players seeded into groups of four according to latest UKBGF rankings
- Knock-out flights on Sunday five separate flights, 16 separate cash prizes
- Guaranteed at least 3 matches each day
- Registration just £25
- Tiered entry from £30 to £300
- Optional side pools and group auction
- Zero rake 100% return of entry, pool and group auction subscriptions
- Bad luck awards
- BMAB-partnered and a UKBGF Tour event.

The tournament will again be held at Greenwood Park Community Centre, 5 minutes from the M1/M25 junction and 10 minutes from St Albans city centre (under 20 minutes by train from St Pancras); if the weather's half decent there will be outdoor play. St Albans offers accommodation to suit all pockets, an extensive Saturday street market (chartered in 1553), a cathedral (oldest site of continuous worship in Britain), Roman Verulamium (excellent museum and hypocaust), and more pubs (and coffee shops) than you can imagine.
